

1. d) In 2016, Canada produced approximately 3 times as many metric tons of lentils as India, the next highest lentil-producing country in the world.
2. b) Honey bees. They were introduced to BC in the 1860s.
3. c) There are approximately 450 types of bees in BC. There are 32 types of bumble bees alone.
4. c) In BC, it takes about 6 city blocks (.5 hectares) to grow enough food to feed one person with conventional farming methods.
5. c) 1/4 of ice-free land is used for livestock. In addition, 1/3 of all cropland is used to grow animal feed.
6. c) The federal government through the Canadian Food Inspection Agency sets organic standards.
7. d) A wide range of vegetables and salad greens can be grown into winter in the Lower Mainland, but green beans need warmer weather.
