The City of Burnaby has launched an innovative partnership to engage residents and develop a community vision that activates climate action on a local level by removing barriers and empowering residents to achieve our carbon-reduction targets.

Through a partnership with the SFU Morris J. Wosk Centre for Dialogue and Vancity, the Urban Resilient Futures Initiative aims to accelerate Burnaby's progress towards a carbon neutral future.

Slated to begin this fall, this three-year initiative includes four key elements:

» Zero Emission Building Retrofit Task Force - Buildings account for about 50% of carbon emissions in Burnaby. The task force will bring together commercial and industrial property owners, government representatives, technical experts and local homeowners to develop quick starts and recommendations for the City's Zero-Emission Building Retrofit Strategy. Recommendations are expected in early 2022.

» Neighbourhood Climate Action **Projects and Awareness** Campaign – This involves fostering neighbourhood-level climate action projects. Community pilot projects are expected to begin in 2022.

» Citizens' Assembly – An independent group of Burnaby residents will make recommendations to the City's upcoming Official Community Plan (OCP) update. Feedback on the OCP is expected in late 2023.

» Participatory Governance - The initiative will engage underrepresented people, including First Nations, and pioneer new systems and processes to create more equity in community discussions.

The Urban Resilient Futures Initiative will incorporate similar deliberative processes as the Mayor's Task Force on Community Housing, which convened in Burnaby in 2019 and has since accelerated action on housing affordability and led to nationleading policy changes.

Once complete, the Urban Resilient Futures model will serve as an example to municipal governments across Canada on how to engage and motivate residents to take an active role in combating climate change.

It's no secret that we're in the midst of a climate crisis.

MESSAGE

I often hear from concerned residents asking what the City is doing, and what they can do to fight climate change at the local level. Eliminating carbon won't be easy, but I'm confident that by working together as a community we can rapidly reduce our carbon footprint.

Once again, Burnaby is ready to lead the way. We are partnering with the SFU Morris J. Wosk Centre for Dialogue and Vancity to launch an innovative project, the Urban Resilient Futures Initiative. This project is an excellent opportunity for Burnaby to be a role model for other cities, inspiring them to take the bold steps necessary to address this crisis.

It will give our community the voice and tools they need to be part of the solution in the fight against climate change. And it will help deliver on the City's ambitious climate action goals, which are outlined in the Burnaby Climate Action Plan Progress Report. As you will see on the following pages, the City has already taken some big steps on climate action.

In the coming weeks, you will hear more about this project and opportunities to get involved. I know we have an engaged and committed community that is ready to do what needs doing to become a carbon neutral city.

The time for action is now.

THIS IS CLIMATE

SIDEWALKS – LET'S WALK & ROLL!

It's easy to take sidewalks for granted. But in fact, sidewalks are an important part of the City's transportation network. And just as the City's draft Transportation Plan is a critical part of our Climate Action Framework, so too are sidewalks.


Sidewalks provide a safe and healthy alternative to vehicle travel. They allow us to walk to school or work, to the transit stop, to the park or community centre, to do our shopping or visit friends. They improve accessibility for people using wheelchairs, scooters and strollers. They promote personal wellness and connected communities.

You told us you want more sidewalks, and we're responding. Burnaby is building dozens of new sidewalks every year, focusing first on streets that are close to schools, parks, community centres and transit facilities.

On some streets, we're adding cycle tracks and multi-use paths to separate walkers from cyclists and rollerbladers, providing an added level of comfort and safety and enhancing Burnaby's cycling network. By 2030, we plan to have Phase 1 of our AAA ("all ages and abilities") cycling network fully in place, providing continuous connections between Burnaby's town centres and neighbouring municipalities.

What can you do? Use them! For short trips to pick up a few groceries or meet a friend, walk or roll and leave the car at home. For longer trips—maybe to your kids' school or the rec centre—grab your helmet and hop on your bike. It's healthy and helps reduce our carbon emissions.




TAKING ACTION TOGETHER

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CLIMATE ACTION PROGRESS REPORT 2020-2021

The City of Burnaby recently released its Climate Action Progress Report 2020-2021, which documents carbon reduction initiatives launched or advanced in the past year-and-a-half. The City has actually been taking steps to reduce corporate and city-wide carbon emissions for decades. But since City Council declared a climate emergency in 2019 and adopted the Climate Action Framework in 2020, we've accelerated our plans and made substantial progress.

Actions highlighted in the report include:

- » Adopting Burnaby's City Energy Strategy
- » Advancing the Bainbridge and Lochdale Urban Village projects
- » Enhancing streamside areas
- » Continuing the development of Burnaby's Transportation Plan
- » Installing public EV charging stations
- » Applying the Green Building Policy
- » Joining the pilot Benchmark BC program

GREENING THE URBAN LANDSCAPE

Trees play a crucial role in Burnaby's Climate Action Framework. They help us maintain and increase the resilience of our ecosystem. They capture and store carbon while producing oxygen. They moderate temperature, cooling our city during hot weather and absorbing stormwater during rainy months. They provide a sanctuary for wildlife.

Parks and protected green space cover 2,400 hectares-nearly a quarter of Burnaby. Thanks to the foresight of Burnaby's past planners and civic leaders, we have a lot of trees. But we need to keep our trees healthy and continue to plant more. To do that, the City has an aggressive tree-planting program and is developing programs like "Tree4Free" to support property owners who'd like to see more trees on City lands in front of their home or business. We're upgrading streets with sidewalks in many areas of the city and incorporating treelined boulevards where we can. We have a Tree Bylaw that protects existing trees and ensures that any tree needing to be removed is replaced with at least one new tree suited to our current and future climate. And we'll soon be introducing an Urban Forest Strategy to keep Burnaby's urban forest healthy and growing-now and in the future.

Here's how you can help:

- » Plant trees on your property that are suited to our current and future climate. Visit **Burnaby.ca** and search "recommended tree list" to learn which species are best suited for your property.
- » Maintain the trees on your property. Before pruning or trimming your trees, consult an arborist or tree service to ensure you don't harm any in the process.
- » Before removing a tree, read Burnaby's Tree Bylaw and understand the replacement requirements. You may need to obtain a Tree Cutting Permit. Visit Burnaby.ca/Trees. If you have questions call 604-294-7130 or email treebylaw@burnaby.ca.

DRIVING TOWARD AN EV FUTURE

With transportation accounting for as much as 50% of Burnaby's total carbon emissions, the writing is on the wall—if we're going to reach our emission reduction targets, we'll have to reduce our vehicle trips and burn less fossil fuel. Enter the electric vehicle—or "EV".

There have never been more reasons to make your next vehicle purchase a battery electric (EV) or plug-in hybrid electric vehicle (PHEV). Not only will you be doing your part by reducing or eliminating vehicle emissions, you may save money as well. With gas prices in Metro Vancouver topping \$1.50 a litre, EV operating costs can be substantially lower than standard vehicle costs. Plus, governments are lining up to give rebates on EVs and PHEVs that meet certain criteria, and on EV chargers in homes, apartments/condos and workplaces.

EV sales are growing rapidly and now make up nearly 10% of all new vehicle



sales in BC. There are currently 50 EV and PHEV models to choose from. They come in all shapes and sizes—from wallet-friendly compacts to family friendly SUVs to sleek sport luxury models. And by 2022, the average range of all new EVs is expected to be 440 km.

Cities like Burnaby are helping pave the way for drivers to switch to EVs. Since 2019, we have installed 32 public EV charging stations in park and civic facility parking lots. And public EV chargers are being installed in places like Tofino, Hope

and Coquihalla Highway rest stops, making weekend getaways to Long Beach or the Okanagan worry free and emissions free.

The City of Burnaby has accepted the "EV challenge", and we'll be replacing many of our aging fleet vehicles with EVs and installing EV chargers at City works yards. Join us on our journey to an electrifying future!


THE CITY OF THE FUTURE IS - A VILLAGE!

Imagine living in a neighbourhood where shopping, dining, work and working out are all just a short walk or ride away. Or, if you need to go somewhere farther away, a transit station or bus stop is also close by. In other words, a neighbourhood so complete and well connected that you'd only need to use a car occasionally—or not at all.

That's the thinking behind the creation of "urban villages" – vibrant, mixed-use, low-carbon, resilient neighbourhoods where housing is diverse and affordable. We're currently in the process of developing new community plans for the Bainbridge and Lochdale neighbourhoods in northeast Burnaby that will shape how these areas evolve over the mid- and long term.

We envision creating urban villages that will help guide change in these neighbourhoods and offer a range of opportunities, including:

- » new public spaces, community services and amenities for residents
- » an expanded mix of market and non-market housing options
- » more local employment opportunities
- » changes and reinvestment as the existing building stock ages
- » a shift to more sustainable modes of transportation (walking, transit, cycling)
- » enhancements to the natural
