

DIRECTOR/CURATOR'S MESSAGE

2018 was a year of intense activity for the team of dedicated staff at the Burnaby Art Gallery. There was a jam-packed exhibition schedule in the galleries and offsite locations with programming options for all ages, educational opportunities for teachers, students and the general public, one hundred and forty new acquisitions to the Permanent Collection, installation of a major public artwork and a number of capital projects that have improved the function of spaces that we work in.

The year kicked off with a well-received exhibition of work by a local artist and national treasure. Molly Lamb Bobak: Talk of the Town, was curated by Dr. Hilary Letwin and paired with the exhibition Julie McIntyre: Travel Stories, an installation of printed paper objects that chronicled the world travels of the artist's grandmother. In April, the 36th annual Arts Alive exhibition featured elementary students' art with the upper gallery showcasing David Ostrem: Why Won't You Be Art?, part of the Capture Photography Festival and curated by Jennifer Cane. Jeff Ladouceur's first solo show in BC, Pearl Path, also curated by Cane, offered graphic interest for all ages throughout the summer months.

Anna Wong: Traveller on Two Roads was the gallery's major exhibition for 2018. The gallery received a significant grant from Heritage Canada for this important exhibition and publication on the life and work of Anna Wong, a master printmaker who grew up in Vancouver's Chinatown. Co-curated by Jennifer Cane and myself, the entire team at the BAG was involved in making this exhibition and its programming a success. The year ended with the remarkable exhibition Picturing Arctic Modernity: North Baffin Drawings from 1964, a travelling exhibition developed by the Agnes Etherington Art Centre and the Canadian Museum of History. Concurrent to these exhibitions, BAG Preparator/Exhibit Coordinator, Bob MacIntyre, curated ten exhibitions at the gallery's offsite locations at Burnaby's McGill and Bob Prittie Libraries.

The BAG programs team developed unique learning activities to complement each of the exhibitions featured in the BAG galleries. In 2018, they developed a number of new programs for school-aged students, hosted two professional development workshops for teachers and created a new *Pinot and Printmaking* series for adults who want to get



creative and socialize. Their most exciting development may have been the new *BAG on a Bike* program which will be fully launched in 2019.

In 2018, acquisitions were brisk. Willingdon Linear Park, which includes an extensive integrated public art installation, *A Rite of Passage*, opened to the public in August. In October, the artists and I were honoured to present a session on the project to the Creative Cities Network of Canada Summit in Toronto. With the support of the Acquisitions Subcommittee, the City of Burnaby Permanent Art Collection accessioned many new works while the Education Collection continued to acquire works that will be used directly with students in both the gallery and in school programs offered throughout Metro Vancouver.

I am grateful for the support of the team of professionals who work together with me to provide a welcoming space in the community. With the generous support of our Burnaby Art Gallery Advisory Committee and other volunteers we continue to make advocacy for artists and the work that they create the priority for the BAG. I would also like to acknowledge the support of our funders: The City of Burnaby, the British Columbia Arts Council, the Province of BC, Heritage Canada and our patrons.

The Willingdon Linear Park was officially opened in 2018, and incorporates public art throughout its entire length. BAGAC members are proud to have played a role in the realisation of this monumental project which also includes art created by local high school students.

Burnaby's youth are continually engaged through the BAG's annual *Arts Alive* exhibition in collaboration with School District 41.

Mandate

The Burnaby Art Gallery operates as an art museum, gallery and community forum to explore and advance knowledge, appreciation and understanding of contemporary and historical visual art through exhibition, programming and collection services in traditional and non-traditional contexts and places in and outside of the City of Burnaby.

Institutional Core Values

Role of the Institution

This is accomplished through free public talks, symposia, and community outreach projects (libraries and non-traditional art museum spaces such as shopping malls, public squares, and community centres) related to exhibitions and public art events that occur within and outside of the art gallery.

EXHIBITIONS

Gallery exhibitions are the primary focus of the Burnaby Art Gallery. Throughout the year, the Gallery provides visitors with challenging, thought-provoking, inspiring and diverse content representing local, regional, and national artistic talent. While focused on works on paper, the artists presented at the Burnaby Art Gallery use many artistic languages to contribute to conversations about culture, politics and lived experience.

2018 began with a tribute to acclaimed Burnaby-raised Canadian artist Molly Lamb Bobak (1920-2014), quest curated by Dr. Hilary Letwin. This exhibition ran concurrently with Julie McIntyre: Travel Stories, which chronicled the adventurous life of the artist's grandmother. Annually, Arts Alive features some of Burnaby's best local artwork, produced by School District #41 students and selected by a jury of fine arts professionals. This year's installment presented the work of the City's High School students. Running alongside this exhibition, David Ostrem's quirky Why Won't You Be Art? was included as part of the Capture Photography Festival. Picturing Arctic Modernity: North Baffin Drawings from 1964, organized by the Canadian Museum of

History and the Agnes Etherington Centre for Art, gave visitors insight into the changes faced by Inuit people, through their own drawings and stories.

An exhibition highlight of the year was Jeff Ladouceur's Pearl Path, presenting the BCborn, New York City-based artist's first solo exhibition at a Canadian public art gallery. A beautiful hardcover book, with a written piece by renowned author Sheila Heti, was produced in conjunction. The major exhibition showcase of the year was Anna Wong: Traveller on Two Roads, a touring exhibition produced by the Burnaby Art Gallery with generous funding from Heritage Canada. Through programs and publications in English, French, Mandarin and Cantonese, the gallery welcomed Burnaby's diverse communities to engage with the practice of this prolific and talented artist.

PUBLIC ART

In August of 2018 Willingdon Linear Park, which includes a monumental integrated public art installation, *A Rite of Passage*, opened to the public. This project was the culmination of several years of collaborative work between City of Burnaby staff and the artists Jennifer Marman, Daniel Borins and James Khamsi. In addition, nationally renowned sculptor, Joe Fafard, generously donated *Bay Bébé II* to the City of Burnaby Permanent Public Art Collection. The powder coated cast bronze foal is situated in Metrotown Civic Square, adjacent to the mare, *Evangeline*, also created by Fafard.

Conservation and maintenance to the Public Art Collection continued in 2018 with cleaning and repairs to *Playground of the Gods* at Burnaby Mountain. *Blacktail*, located on the Beresford Art Walk, also received annual maintenance to repair damage caused by skateboards. At Deer Lake Park, Bodo Pfeifer's *Untitled Blocks* was conserved and returned to its original 1972 condition. The concrete blocks were painted dandelion yellow and mirror-finish plates replaced the damaged tops. Foundational plantings and edging were also added to the site.



Private Development public art selection continued to be brisk in the City of Burnaby throughout the year. New artists represented in the private sector collection include Myfanwy MacLeod and Metz and Chew.

PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Burnaby Art Gallery public programs are designed to encourage interaction with works, ideas, and concepts relating to the gallery's feature exhibitions – including works from the City of Burnaby Permanent Art Collection and works on loan. The aim is to reach a broad audience and address the interests of diverse segments of the Burnaby and Metro Vancouver population.

This year the Burnaby Art Gallery offered 100 public programs and arts events throughout the year drawing in over 3,200 participants with an overall attendance of over 4300 people. A wide variety of talks, tours, art workshops, and events were offered.

Of note was the family drop-in program Drawing Jam led by artist Jeff Ladouceur whose art was exhibited in the galleries over the summer. Public programs held alongside the Anna Wong exhibition - multilingual tours, curatorial tours, panel discussions about the art and life of Anna Wong, and art workshops —were all very well attended. The documentary and historical nature of Picturing Arctic Modernity inspired crowds to attend both the curatorial talk led by special guest curator Dr. Norman Vorano and the drawing workshop What We Do to Make a Seal Skin Drawing led by artist and educator, Mark Igloliorte.

Due to past successes, the programs department expanded the kids' summer camps by a week. Also popular throughout the year were the parent & tot and children's classes. Growing interest in the adult *Printmaking & Pinot* series, led to classes reaching capacity and developing waitlists by year end. Hands-on programs for all ages continued to be strong. The *In the BAG* family program remained popular – some days were so busy, seating was limited. Other well-attended events included Canada Day at Swangard Stadium, The Burnaby Blues + Roots Festival and Seasonal Celebrations at the Shadbolt Centre for the Arts.

This year also marks the development of the capital campaign project BAG on a Bike—a public outreach project created to engage the general public in printmaking activities using a small letter press mounted on the back of an electric bike. The team is working toward programming the bike for festivals, community events, farmers' markets, and more in the new year.

Looking ahead to 2019, we will continue to plan diverse programs, while building our sense of community and encouraging new groups to explore fine arts.



SCHOOL PROGRAMS


Over 5750 students across Metro Vancouver had opportunities to learn about and make art with the Burnaby Art Gallery this year. Students visited the Gallery to learn about exhibitions and participate in studio art workshops, contributed artwork to the annual Arts Alive exhibit, studied original artwork in their classrooms, and gained work experience through valuable career programs.

Teachers participated in a number of on- and off-site professional development opportunities —including workshops centered around integrating Indigenous art content into classrooms—meeting demands of the new BC school curriculum. Working closely with the Burnaby School District, the BAG continues to offer subsidized programs to classes across the district, creating accessible and inclusive opportunities for all students to experience an art gallery setting.

Building on the past success of the Artist Apprenticeship Program, the Gallery expanded this innovative career placement program to involve pieces from the Permanent Art Collection. Classes ran in the fall and a feature exhibit will take place in spring 2019. This exhibition will be featured alongside Arts Alive 2019.

The Gallery's outreach programs remain the most successful of the school programs. Three new outreach workshops were launched in 2018, with a fourth under development. Cities and Structures brings architectural concepts, urban planning and community development ideas to the classroom, Anna's Press, developed to complement Anna Wong: Traveller on Two Roads, is the Gallery's newest BAG in a Box program. Multilingual lesson plans, inspired by Anna Wong's practice, were also developed and made accessible online to educators in the fall. With a launch date in 2019, the BAG's programs team has been working hard to complete a cross-curricular outreach program, Where Coast Salish Art and Math Collide, involving the work and inspiration of contemporary artist and educator, Dylan Thomas, and pieces from the Salish Weave Collection.

Part-day school tours and studio programs also experienced consistent visitors. These on-site educational programs cultivated learning by engaging students in thoughtful observations and discussions about the featured exhibits, followed by hands-on creative activities in the Fireside Room.



COLLECTIONS 2018

123 works of art were donated to the City of Burnaby Permanent Art Collection in 2018. With an appraised value of more than \$80,000, these works significantly enhance the collection, which holds more than 5,700 artworks for the enjoyment of the citizens of Burnaby, and elsewhere. Unique in its focus, the collection is specialized to works on paper, and is the only public art collection of its kind in Canada.



VOLUNTEERING

Our outstanding team of Burnaby Art Gallery volunteers shared their talents and enthusiasm in various ways in 2018, contributing a total of 2202 hours to support the Gallery.

Volunteers were engaged in a wide range of areas and activities ranging from art assistants with our popular school programs, greeting and serving visitors at our opening receptions, and supporting Burnaby Art Gallery public art programs. Volunteers also served their time at local special events and festivals including Rhodofest, The Chinese Heritage Festival, Canada Day, the Burnaby Blues + Roots Festival and Culture Days. An amazing group of secondary students were welcomed by the gallery to fulfill career placement hours and contributed as camp leaders in both the gallery's spring and summer camps.

Our talented volunteers continue to support the Gallery's In the BAG Family Sunday monthly program by welcoming members of the community to explore free and inclusive family-friendly art activities. Through the Artist Apprenticeship Program and Arts Alive, more career placement opportunities were provided to Burnaby youth interested in pursuing careers in the arts. The Artist Apprenticeship

Program provides teens with a hands-on opportunity to be mentored by local artists and arts administrators as they create art and develop an exhibition as a team. In 2018, the Burnaby Art Gallery welcomed 11 teens into this program, earning them a total of 396 work experience hours. Celebrating its 36th year of Arts Alive, the Gallery showcased work by secondary school students from across the Burnaby School District. Student volunteers from local secondary schools assisted with this exhibition in roles which included Jurving and Photo Documentation and Virtual Exhibit Creation. In 2018, 3 volunteers were engaged in behind the scenes aspects of the Arts Alive exhibition, contributing a total of 116 hours.

We also recognize the incredible efforts of our dedicated BAGAC volunteers, who work tirelessly to support the vision and mandate of the Burnaby Art Gallery. The Burnaby Art Gallery staff team sincerely appreciates and thanks all of these hardworking and enthusiastic volunteers!
