
Immigration and language trends in Burnaby

Immigrant population in Burnaby


In the late 1990s, more than half of Burnaby's population was born in Canada. By 2016*, more than half of the city's population was born outside Canada.






Burnaby's immigrant population is the second highest within the Metro Vancouver area, behind the City of Richmond where immigrants represent just over 60% of the population.



Burnaby's immigrant population by period of immigration to Canada




Time period of immigration

Why do people immigrate to Canada?

People immigrate to Canada for a variety of reasons. Some immigrants come to Canada to reunite with family members who settled here. Others come to start businesses or work in Canada, or as refugees seeking shelter from hardships at home.

Burnaby has a higher proportion of Economic Immigrants than the region as a whole.

Reasons for Immigrating to Canada (2016 Census)



^{* &}quot;Economic immigrants" includes immigrants who have been selected for their ability to contribute to Canada's economy through their ability to meet labour market needs to own and manage or to build a business to make a substantial investment to create their own employment or to meet specific provincial or territorial labour market needs.




^{** &}quot;Other immigrants" includes immigrants who were granted permanent resident status under a program that does not fall under the economic immigrants, the immigrants sponsored by family or the refugee categories.

Most immigrants settling in Burnaby came to Canada in their prime working years between 15 and 44 years old.



Immigrant share in Burnaby's labour force


Immigrants make up more than half of Burnaby's labour force. Their unemployment rate is slightly lower than that of Canadian born Burnaby residents. However, the unemployment rate of recent immigrants is higher than that of the Canadian born population.

- » In 2021, the proportion of Burnaby residents who primarily speak English at home dropped to 62%.*
