» 6.1 Universal Water Metering Strategy

Burnaby City Council approved recommendations to continue the transition towards universal water metering across the City. Currently, all new commercial, multi-dwelling buildings and single- and two-family dwellings are required to install a water meter prior to occupancy. The new recommendations outline the next steps, including installing meters for homes that already have a water service connection that can fit a meter, and for homes with existing secondary suites. It is anticipated that these actions will take up to 3 years to complete. Installing universal water meters helps encourage water conservation and early leak detection, reducing wastage in the water system.

» 7.1 Adaptive Fitness Equipment in Recreation Facilities

City Council directed staff to conduct a review of the adaptive fitness equipment in the City's recreation centres, including possible improvements and costs required, and report back to the Access Advisory Committee and Council.

» 8.1 2024 Living Wage Rate Update

City Council received an update regarding the 2024 Living Wage rate. The City will adopt the increase, ensuring staff are paid an hourly rate of a minimum of \$27.05. The Living Wage is set annually by Living wage for Families BC which represents the amount that a family of four needs to earn to meet their living expenses including: food, clothing, rental housing, childcare, transportation and two weeks savings for each adult to cover illness or emergencies.
