
We're listening! Public input is being sought every step of the way

At the City of Burnaby, we believe in the power of community. Burnaby's Official Community Plan (OCP), also known as Burnaby 2050, sets the long-term vision for managing the city's growth. Since its start in 2022, we've been inspired by over 30,000 public comments. We've engaged extensively with Host Nations, community partners and the public across four consultation phases.



Housing: Increasing affordability and supply

Housing affordability and supply is top of mind for Burnaby residents. That's why we've been working on implementing HOME: Burnaby's Housing and Homelessness Strategy, created with extensive community input. Here are some of the things we've been doing:

- 1. **Rental housing:** We're focusing on non-market rental housing with affordable rents. In 2024, there were 1,356 units of non-market rental housing being built in Burnaby. Now, we have more than 9,000 units of non-market rental housing under construction or in the approvals process. This contributes to a total of 19,000 rental units in progress.
- 2. Tenant assistance: Burnaby's tenant assistance policy protects people displaced from their purpose-built rental homes due to development requiring rezoning. They could get help moving, finding a new place to rent, financial help, and more. We keep improving this policy to meet community needs.
- 3. New R1 residential zoning district to increase housing supply: This new zoning combines 12 previous residential zones. It allows up to six dwelling units to be built on lots previously zoned for single family homes. This means more types and choices of homes for everyone.
- 4. New Burnaby Housing Authority for non-market housing: This new housing authority focuses on growing the non-market rental housing supply. It allows the City to be more nimble in responding to development opportunities and housing needs.

THIS IS CLIMATE ACTION

Burnaby trucks powered by **recycled cooking oil**

We're taking a big step toward achieving our climate action goals by converting all City trucks and heavy equipment to run on used cooking oil. The City's fleet has switched to HDRD (hydrogenation-derived renewable diesel), which is produced from used vegetable/cooking oils and animal fats from the food industry.

This simple change reduces vehicle emissions by 70%. We were able to do this without investing in new equipment—all our existing trucks and equipment can use this cleaner-burning fuel just like regular diesel.

While this is a big step, it's not the end of our journey to zero emissions. Our fleet will continue to modernize. Burnaby welcomed its first electric garbage collection truck in 2024, and as our existing fleet vehicles reach the end of their service life, we'll be transitioning to other cleaner alternatives.

What is "renewable diesel"?

Our fleet uses HDRD (hydrogenation-derived renewable diesel), which is produced from used vegetable/ cooking oils and animal fats from restaurants and food production. While it's often blended with ordinary diesel, Burnaby's fuel is 'RD100', which means that 100% of the fuel is renewable.

Preparing for extreme heat

We have a number of places you can go to help you cope with hot summer weather and the potential for extreme heat, which can be deadly for vulnerable people.

Cooling centres: During extreme heat, the City will open cooling centres (10 am to 10 pm daily until the heat subsides). All cooling centres have comfortable seating, drinking water, washrooms, Wi-Fi and electrical outlets.

- » Bonsor Recreation Complex (6550 Bonsor Ave)
- » Temporary Cameron Community Centre at The City of Lougheed Shopping Centre (9855 Austin Avenue)
- » Edmonds Community Centre (7433 Edmonds St)
- » Eileen Dailly Leisure Pool & Fitness Centre (240 Willingdon Ave)

City facilities: You can also go to any public City facility during operating hours to find relief from the heat. This includes all recreation centres, libraries, Shadbolt Centre for the Arts, Burnaby Village Museum and City Hall.

Pop-up outdoor cooling station: The City also supports a pop-up outdoor cooling station, run by the Society to End Homelessness in Burnaby at Civic Square (6100 Willingdon Ave, outside Bob Prittie Metrotown Library).

Urban Forest Strategy: a greener Burnaby

Did you know Burnaby is set to plant 130,000 more trees by 2075? The Urban Forest Strategy is our plan to protect, enhance and grow Burnaby's trees for generations to come. We plan to increase the city's tree coverage from 32% to 40% by 2075—this means planting over 130,000 trees in places like parks, boulevards, natural areas and around civic facilities. That's equal to eight Central Parks!

We're focusing on the quality of new trees, too. We're planting drought-tolerant native species like Douglas Fir and Western Hemlock, which can better handle difficult conditions and invasive species.

Listening to our community

New sidewalk program

You told us Burnaby needs a high-quality pedestrian network—and we're delivering!

We're building new sidewalks in response to what we've heard from residents, businesses and community organizations. We choose new locations based on pedestrian demand, safety and accessibility. We also look at distance to transit, schools, parks, seniors' housing, civic facilities and high-density areas. New sidewalks do not require additional taxpayer funding, since they're paid for by existing capital reserves.

Last year, we completed:

- » the Broadway and Sperling intersection
- » a multi-use pathway along Sperling from Broadway to Adair
- » the Kitchener and Duthie intersection

We're now looking at other routes across the city for future upgrades. Nearby residents will be notified before construction takes place. Learn more about the new sidewalks at **Burnaby.ca/NewSidewalks**

Public **EV Charging** Strategy

You told us you'd like to see more public EV charging stations, and we're building them!

Did you know that by 2035, 40% of vehicles will be electric? With the rise of EVs, we need public charging to help us move to sustainable transportation and reach our climate targets.

Last summer, we gathered feedback from the community to understand how electric vehicles are being used and to explore future opportunities. This feedback helped shape our Public EV Charging Strategy, which recommended focusing on

high-demand areas and collaborating with partners to make charging more accessible for you. Learn more at **Burnaby.ca/EV**

With new charging stations at the Rosemary Brown Recreation Centre, we now have 65 public changing stations!





Building tomorrow: Infrastructure for generations

1) Fire Station 8 (complete)

The new Fire Station 8 on Burnaby Mountain is now open. This station helps firefighters respond faster and cover more areas during emergencies, ensuring the well-being and safety of our community. The 15,000-square-foot building has a separated decontamination space for crews and has been seismically designed to meet post-disaster standards.

2) Jack Crosby Sports Box (complete)

The Jack Crosby Sports Box renovations are now done, turning this into a covered facility for year-round sports. You'll be able to use the hard-court surface for lacrosse, ball hockey, pickleball and badminton all year round.

3) Rowan Avenue Child Care Centre (near complete)

This new facility in the Deer Lake Park area will provide 74 child care spaces. While priority will be provided to City of Burnaby and RCMP staff, the facility will also provide spaces for community use.

4) Cameron Community Centre and Library

The new Cameron complex will become the civic heart of Lougheed Town Centre. It will have a library, aquatic facility, gymnasium, fitness facilities, youth and senior spaces, and more!

5) Burnaby Lake Recreation Complex

This facility in central Burnaby will be a hub for sports and recreation. It will feature a 50-metre pool with 10 lanes, a diving tower and boards, a combined leisure and six-lane 25-metre pool, and an NHL-sized arena.

6) James Cowan Theatre redevelopment

This state-of-the-art facility will have a 364-seat theatre, versatile studios and enhanced accessibility. It will be a hub for arts and culture in Burnaby, with a modern venue for performances, workshops and community events.



7) Mintara atop Burnaby Mountain patio expansion

The existing open-air patio is being replaced with a new, enclosed one featuring a timber frame and glass roof system. The new patio will offer 50 seats in addition to the 120 indoor seats and will be ideal for both dining and special events.

8) Community Safety Building

We are building a new three-storey, 129,000-square-foot Community Safety Building which will house the RCMP detachment, replacing the existing detachment, built in 1967.

9) Brentwood Community Centre

This new facility in the heart of Brentwood will offer a wide range of amenities for all ages. It will include a gymnasium, fitness facilities, music and art rooms, childminding and more.

10) Burnaby Lake Overpass

This new pedestrian-cyclist overpass will span Highway 1, creating a critical north-south link between key regional trail networks and destinations within Burnaby.
